VISION:


An internet free from child sexual abuse

- Not-for profit child protection organisation established 28 years ago.
- We **identify images and videos** showing the sexual abuse of children.
- We work with partners and law enforcement globally to have them removed.
- Reporting portals in
 54 countries latest being Sri Lanka

- We provide datasets and services

 including IWF Hash List and
 URL List to companies to
 prevent and disrupt child sexual
 abuse.
- We work with tech companies to support them to build safety tech of the future.





Finding content

 Public reports
 We take public reports in the UK and from our 54 international portals.

Police and Industry

We take reports from police as well as reports from the internet industry.

Proactive

Our analysts proactively search all public areas of the internet.

- Reports from child victims Children can report to us in the UK via Report Remove and in India through the Meri Trust Line.
- **Crawling** We use technology to automatically crawl from site to site looking for known content.

VISION:

An internet free from child sexual abuse

Every 80 seconds, IWF analysts assess a webpage.

Every 114 seconds, that webpage shows a child being sexually abused.

Scale of the problem in 2023



Reports assessed

275,652

Reports were confirmed to contain images or videos of children suffering sexual abuse

1,000,000+

As each report contains at least one, and sometimes thousands of images, **this equates to millions of criminal images** removed from the internet.










Sexual imagery created of children when they are online, often in the supposed 'safe spaces' of their bedrooms, now accounts for almost **nine in every ten** reports.

This is preventable!


2,401 'Self-generated' images of 3-6 year olds

Analysis of 3–6-year-olds in 'self-generated' imagery.

Analysis based on individual image hashes from 2023

LOCATION:

Nearly half were recorded in a bedroom (47%).

SEX:

 \bigcirc **91%** were girls.

PROXIMITY TO OTHERS:

Most were pictured seemingly alone: A quarter involved at least one other child (28%).

ANALYSIS OF ACTIVITY:

3/5

showed "sexual posing with nudity" 16%

showed rubbing of genitals



showed penetration – children penetrating themselves, or another child



Sexual Extortion of children

across the UK today (Monday 29 April).


2023 IWF analysts confirmed 176 reports of sexual extortion.

This is more than eight times as many as the previous year.



Sexual Extortion - 'Sextortion' of children

- <u>Sexually motivated</u>: Offenders coerce victims into producing intimate and sexually explicit photos or videos.
- Sexual gratification The production of more often increasingly extreme imagery.
- Images and coercion may be used facilitate contact abuse.
- Victim contact details may be 'traded' with other offenders and used in swaps as a form of human currency.



- Financially motivated: sexually coerced extortion or 'sextortion' is a type of blackmail where offenders use intimate photos or videos of their victims to extort money from them.
- Financial Reward Offenders target young people and adults alike.
- When shared online, the publication of the images signals the end stage of the extortion process.

Boy/Girl Image Prevalence (Online Reports)


In 2022

97% of the reports showed girls (264,246)

1 % of the reports showed boys (3,251)


5% of the reports showed both sexes (5,394)

A small number were unidentifiable.



Sextortion: The Threat / 'MO'

- Identify target online (Social Media)
- Approach and befriend
- Request to connect in separate 'private' message space
- Suggest swapping of nude images
- Demand money / more images / access to siblings / friends



Offender: "I have screenshot all ur followers and tags can send this nudes to everyone and also send your nudes to your Family and friends Until it goes viral...All you've to do is to cooperate with me and I won't expose you"

Offender: "Are you gonna cooperate with me"

Victim: "I'm kms rn" ["I'm kill myself right now"]

Victim: "Bc of you" ["Because of you"]
















IWF and Childline Partnership



Report Remove – Support for victims

IWF & NSPCC developed Report Remove to support a young person in reporting their own sexual images or videos for removal from the internet.

- Childline supports and safeguards the child;
- The child reports their image/video to IWF through a dedicated portal, verifying their age with Yoti.
- IWF analysts assess the imagery against UK law. A criminal image will be removed from internet and hashed.
- Childline contacts the child to provide updates on their report.

The process is child-centered; does not identify them and ensures the child will not inadvertently be criminalised.
